another councillor has already served for longer: step forward Jane Tunnell-Westmacott. She has been on the council so long that the exact date of her election is lost in the mists of time but the provisional estimate is that she has been in office for 35 years which include a long stint as deputy mayor. So well done, Jane, for all you do for the town as a councillor, as trustee of four charities and in many other capacities.

And also well done to Sue Lofthouse who has stood down after 20+ years. We are lucky to have councillors who devote so much time and energy to serving the community.

On the front of the May edition of The Bridge we put a photograph of a tree which we took in Burford last year. At the time we couldn't remember exactly where it was but going round the excellent open gardens provided the answer: it is on the right-hand side of Swan Lane Close and we believe it is an Acer griseum (paperbark maple). Burford Festival

The Mayor's Reception to start the Burford Festival was very well attended with a real "buzz" on a lovely sunny evening. It was good to meet so many residents old and new and welcome some from Cotswold Gate. We were provided with lovely food from Jane and Mary, and our councillors ran the free bars. My thanks to all involved, and the Warwick Hall for hosting the event, making a great start to the Festival.

What is the future of The Recreation Ground Pavilion?

I wanted to share the Council's concern about the future of the pavilion building on the Recreation Ground which may be reaching the end of its economic life.

The pavilion was built in the 1960s, and was constructed of wood with a felt flat roof. The roof has leaked for some time and the front has deteriorated badly. With no showers and with outside toilets, it is not up to current standards for facilities to support sports teams.

We are having the structure evaluated for safety, and then we need to decide what to do about it.

We will be asking the community and the users of the recreation ground for their suggestions for upgrade or demolition and possible replacement on the site. As ever, there will be a problem with funding but first, we need to have a conversation about what is needed for Burford recreation ground for the next 20-30 years. Look out for more in next month's edition.

Double Yellow Lines on The Hill

The double yellow lines first installed by OCC in 2005 on the pavement on The Hill, which had faded over time, have now been repainted, as recently many vehicles have parked there illegally. OCC are now able to, and will now start, to enforce the parking restriction. Vehicles are allowed to access the pavement for loading/unloading, but not for parking. I hope residents will respect this and ensure any visitors/contractors do so too.

Finally, welcome to our new councillor

Clare Sylvester will be joining the council in July. She was part of our Play Area Committee, and I welcome her now after her election onto the full council and look forward to working with her.

Blue Cross pet charity in Burford is thanking its team of dedicated volunteer pet foster carers who go the extra mile to care for homeless pets until permanent owners are found by caring for them in their own home; from small pets like degus and chinchillas to dogs, cats and even horses. The charity is




also calling on local animal lovers to find out more about becoming a volunteer foster carer and sign up. Hannah Wiltshire, Centre Manager at Blue Cross in Burford, said: "We are so grateful to all of our volunteers who foster pets for us. We know they find the experience incredibly rewarding and some even say it has been life changing, for both themselves and the pets they have cared for. Being in a home environment is so much better for pets and it

also means more space in our rehoming centres to help animals in desperate need. For puppies and kittens it is essential for them to be around the usual household sights and sounds to enable them to grow into happy and confident adult

Blue Cross aims to rehome 10,000 pets per year by 2026 and is calling out to local animal lovers to sign up as volunteer foster carers to help the charity to reach this ambitious aim.

Rob Thomas and his wife Bev have fostered 60 dogs for Blue Cross in Burford since starting seven years ago and are currently fostering a three-year-old Cavalier King Charles spaniel called Bailey for the charity until a forever home can be found. Bailey came into the charity after his previous owner passed away. Rob said: "The reason we foster is that it's so rewarding to see what difference we can make to the dogs' lives, and how they open up in a home environment.'



Foster carers receive full training and all costs, including travel, are covered by Blue Cross and there is full support and guidance throughout. BROUGHTON CASTLE AND THE ROUNDHEADS



On 21 May, the Burford & District Society was given a tour of Broughton Castle, which some 40 of us enjoyed immensely. To date the owners have included 22 Lords Saye and Sele and our guide took us briefly through the history of the house over the last eight centuries. It was all well done; but the guide was I think a little hard on William Fiennes, 1st Viscount and 8th Baron Saye and Sele (1582–1662), who took the side of Parliament during the Civil Wars of the mid 17th century. Specifically she referred to him darkly as 'plotting' against Charles I, as if Saye was clearly a villain.

There is another point of view. Some would say that Fiennes was a principled man, who disagreed strongly with Charles about politics and religion and was prepared to fight for what he stood for, despite the dangers. Saye opposed King Charles during the so-called 'Eleven Years Tyranny' of 1629-1640, when Charles ruled without Parliament; and he strongly resisted the payment of the ship-money tax, because it had not been authorised by statutory law. In the 'Short Parliament' of 1640 he was one of the few peers who sided with the Commons in demanding the redress of grievances before supply; and it was after King Charles dissolved that Parliament that Broughton Castle was searched, in the hope of finding treasonable documents. This led to Saye being accused of plotting; but, when I was at school, I was taught that the Civil War was a 'struggle for the Constitution'.

Saye was also a Puritan and he was critical of Charles I and Archbishop Laud's attempts to move the Church of England in what many considered to be a Roman Catholic direction. His schemes to colonise the Americas were intended to undermine the Spanish empire, that great bastion of Catholicism. These differences about religious matters may not mean much to us now; but they mattered a great deal in 17th century England.

For all his apparent radicalism, Lord Saye was no revolutionary. Charles I's principal adviser wrote that he 'had not the least thought of dissolving the monarchy, and less of levelling the ranks and distinctions of men.' Though Saye and his sons fought for Parliament, he opposed the execution of Charles I in 1649 and thought that those who had established a republic had gone much too far. He once famously remarked that he had not fought the King to be ruled by 'ploughboys'; and, in 1660, he welcomed the Restoration of Charles II. Stephen Cooper, Chairman of the Burford and District Society

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Helen Bryce donations by her grandchildren



Around 1916 the artist Helen Bryce came with her mother to Littleham, near Burford bridge, setting up her studio probably on the first floor looking over the road and meadows upstream. Later Miss Bryce, an accomplished artist, had a house built at Cocklands Hill, Fulbrook, and set up a press there to produce greeting cards until the 1970s. Burford Tolsey Museum holds some of Helen's sketch books and several paintings of local scenes; her 'Impression of Burford High Street' is now featured on one of the Burford Tolsey's exclusive greeting cards. Miss Bryce also led the team who created the famous Burford dolls house, and for which she personally made all its lifelike residents.


In connection with a forthcoming book that the Burford Tolsey Museum is developing, we recently managed to trace the whereabouts of her grandchildren in London. This resulted in us welcoming her grandson Leigh and granddaughter Susie to the Museum on 6 June to see our collection. To mark their visit and thank us for appreciating and celebrating their grandmother's work, Leigh presented us with a wonderful folder packed with pristine examples of Helen Bryce's Christmas and greeting cards. His sister Susie separately presented the Museum with a painting that her grandmother had left to her which had the following explanation on the back, "Keylocks Petrol Station, High Street, before alteration".

The above photo shows left to right, Susie and her husband Clive, Peter Martin (BTMA trustee), Leigh and Penny, his wife, who made the folder. The other pictures are of the painting together with a modern image of the subject matter. The hawk-eyed will quickly spot, or already know, that today there is a pull-in space immediately in front of the the two bay windows shown in green on the painting. This was to allow vehicles access to the two petrol pumps which swung out over the pavement. The pumps have long since gone but we are left with this wonderful 1920s image of this section of the High Street, thanks to the donors' generosity.

The collecting policy of the Burford Tolsey can be found on our website under 'More About Us' but in short, items for our permanent collections must have a significance and/or relevance to Burford and its surrounding district. This simply means that items must demonstrate a strong association with Burford and its environs by having been made or used in the area, or by being strongly identified with its heritage or culture

Items not meeting these criteria will not usually be accepted, especially if it would be more appropriate for them to be offered to another museum or archive. We will always try to suggest other museums or archives if we think that an object would be better suited to another collection.

They Run With Surprising Swiftness
The Women Athletes of Early Modern Britain.

Women have battled for place in the maledominated world of sports throughout the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, overturning obstacles and highlighting the changing position of women in societies around the world. This has become one of the defining stories of our age and the central story of women's sports. This talk tells a different and much older, forgotten story with many of the same themes.



Sports have never been the sole preserve of men; women athletes have always been there. Throughout the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries in Britain, women of all ages ran, fought, rode, played football, cricket, tennis, and other sports. They competed in tough, head-to-head events that required extraordinary endurance and skill. Though not labelled "athletic" at the time, these women performed feats that in our age would certainly earn that description. Peter Radford's talk, based on his book, recognises these remarkable athletes and their achievements and aims to restore them to their rightful place in the long history of women in sport.

Peter Radford is a former British athlete, who competed at 100 and 200 metres (and 100 and 220 yards), broke world records, and won Olympic medals.

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GILBERT JESSOP MEMORIAL



The legendary cricketer Gilbert Laird Jessop, who still holds the record for the fastest century (76 balls) by an Englishman in a Test match,




was honoured at Burford School in May, to commemorate his link with the school and the 150th anniversary of his birth.



Jessop's famous innings was played during the Test match between England and Australia in 1902. England, needing 263 to win, had fallen to 48 for 5 when Jessop went in to bat. After his whirlwind innings England scraped home by one wicket. Jonny Bairstow came closest to breaking the record in 2022 with a hundred in 77 balls.

The Old Burfordians Association was happy to fund the project as a mark of respect for Jessop who taught at Burford Grammar School (as it then was) in 1893-94 before going on to represent Cambridge University, Gloucestershire and England.

The unveiling was performed by Jessop's granddaughter Lucy and his daughter-in-law Pat and in attendance were several Old Burfordians, the headteacher and the two captains of Jessop House, Kat

v Girls match, which took place at Burford in June 1894 and it is widely believed that Jessop played a prominent role in getting this match played between the youngest boys of the school and the daughters of the masters and local businessmen. The girls won.

The Bridge carries many articles recommending books to read but we can't remember any about audio books which are popular amongst those who are on the move and the visually

The editors have been enjoying listening to the Just William stories by Richmal Crompton (1890 -1969). The author started her career as a schoolteacher but lost the use of her right leg through polio at the age of 33 and gave up teaching to become a full-time writer. And what a writer she was, producing 41 novels for adults, nine short story collections and 38 books of the Just William series. The William stories were originally intended for adults but proved popular with children and were hugely successful, with 12 million copies being sold. The protagonist, William Brown, is a schoolboy who gets into various scrapes but always somehow comes out on top through a combination of good luck and sheer cunning. The supporting cast includes his gang, The Outlaws, their deadly enemies the Hubert Laneites and the immortal Violet Elizabeth Bott (catchphrase: "I'll theream and theream until I'm thick - I can, you know!").

Although of their time, the humour and invention of the stories remain fresh. The recordings were originally made for the BBC by Martin Jarvis who shows amazing virtuosity in providing different voices and accents for the various characters. They come in 15 minute episodes so don't need much concentration to listen to. Highly recommended.

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THE WINDRUSH VALLEY FLOWER SHOW

And Red Devils, Classic Cars and many more delights



The Windrush Valley Flower Show is something of an annual institution, and one of which the remarkably small team of organisers can be justifiably proud, with many features of the show remaining the same today as when it first started in Little Barrington in the 1960s.

Today, thanks to the generosity of the Wingfield family, Great Barrington village hall plays host to regular competitions of home grown produce, cakes, preserves, wine and handicrafts, all judged by local experts. Prizes and trophies are awarded in a ceremony at the end of the day. With many keen local artists the art and photography categories are increasingly popular; the show also includes needlecraft, floral displays and other handicraft competitions for all ages, demonstrating a remarkably talented local community.

Since 2020, and in response to increasingly popular public demand, the show has included an area for visitors with classic cars and vintage tractors. Proving a popular venue for local and regional classic car clubs, many seeking a target for the summer club 'runs', the show has been privileged and delighted to welcome a wide range of vehicles. Entry is offered free to driver and passenger, and there is a splendid tankard for the Most Popular Car Award following a public vote during the show. The public vote tickets are then entered into a raffle draw for a special prize.

This year the highlight of the day will be a scheduled display by the Parachute Regiment Freefall team, the Red Devils. Following cancellation in 2023 owing to appalling weather, the show arena will be transformed into a drop zone for the 13 man team, jumping in formation and displaying flags from 15,000 feet. The parachute team's ground and liaison group will 'talk down' the jump, having marked the area with smoke canisters to indicate wind direction. The Red Devils' static displays will include a demonstration of parachute packing, augmented reality headsets and photo opportunities. Also, three former tandem jump students will be selling raffle tickets for our star prize, an exclusive training day and tandem jump with the Red Devils.

In the field adjacent to the hall you will find the traditional teatent, BBQ, Pimms stand, ice cream vendor and Nutmeg & Thyme vegan foods, all supplying delicious foods and drink to be enjoyed during the afternoon.

In addition, there are plans afoot to reintroduce some of the traditional children's races, including egg and spoon race, sack race and three legged races. The regular games such as splat the rat, the ladder game, plus dog photography, the ever popular dog show and agility course, will all be present, accompanied by the delightful sounds of Yarnton Brass Band.

Unusually, the show was not devised purely with the intention of raising money - its mission is to engage with the community spirit. Any profits generated are divided between the four participating villages to use for community projects for the benefit of everyone.

Do come and visit the show - bring your dog, classic car or tractor! Entry fee is just £2.50, children under 15 free. Saturday 27 July from 1pm - go to

As our contribution to the Festival we held a panel debate on 10 June on how West Oxfordshire - and Burford in particular can meet the challenge of coming off oil to heat our houses and the energy transition needed before 2040. We need to reduce emissions by 78% by 2035 and by 100% by 2040, and to move all households who are currently on gas or – in Burford's case – oil onto electricity, all of which will need to be supplied by renewables. This will involve a major upgrading of the electricity transmission network across the UK. If it sounds ambitious, it certainly is – but it comes with benefits too, as transitioning away from fossil fuels to renewables will reduce overall demand by a massive 40%.



Panellists included Barbara Hammond, CEO of Oxford-based Low Carbon Hub (LCH), responsible for funding 55 renewable energy installations throughout the county and saving over 2600 tonnes of CO₂ every year, OCC councillors Dr Pete Sudbury and Gayle Pilkington, our local Burfordbased grid connection consultancy Roadnight Taylor to give the global picture, and Geordie Stewart from funding advisors Cosy Homes Oxfordshire. We are indeed fortunate in Oxfordshire in having LCH – an organisation that is unique in the UK – but, as we discovered, other county organisations are able to help with funding, which is available for retrofitting houses of all sizes and all ages. We also have courses in the county that offer training in the skills necessary for the energy transition, in the shape of the Abingdon & Witney College's Net Zero Skills Hub, proving that there are local jobs to be had in moving to a greener world.

We heard about some of the challenges of moving some of our 'legacy' houses over to electricity from fossil fuels, but also about some of the rewards possible on houses old and new: Burford residents who have installed heat pumps are saving money whilst they save on emissions, with one household saving £120 per month during the wintertime, and the consumption of another retrofit falling from 11kW to 3kW, whilst doubling the size of the house. Funding is available too, under the Home Upgrade Grant phase 2 (HUG2) and Green Homes Grant Local Authority Delivery scheme. Households suffering from fuel poverty – of which there 102 in the Burford area alone – are particularly targeted by these schemes. If anybody is curious about what the costs and benefits of improving home insulation and installing a heat pump, please let me know.

BURFORD FIREFIGHTER AWARDED BRITISH EMPIRE MEDAL

Burford on-call firefighter Steve Edginton has been awarded the British Empire Medal in the latest King's Honours list for his dedication to the community over more than forty years.

Steve was born in Burford, moved away as a child before returning at the age of 18 to build his own house in the town. He says he "reluctantly" joined the fire and rescue service in September 1980 but now could not see himself being anything other than an on-call firefighter.

Steve explains: "Back in the 80s there was a relative shortage of local people available to the service, so I thought I'd do my bit for the community and joined up, thinking little about it. Now, 44 years later, I look back with pride and can say without a doubt it was the best decision I ever made.

Speaking about being awarded the British Empire Medal, Steve said: "This is such an unexpected honour. I'm an on-call firefighter because I love the role, the responsibility, the opportunity to meet people and to play my part in keeping them safe, and because of the camaraderie among the crew at Burford Fire Station. I share this honour with my wife Sue who has always been tremendously supportive and has got used to me being whisked away to deal with a call.

"When we enjoy a quiet evening together or when we go out locally for an evening meal, we know our plans could be disrupted at any moment by my emergency pager. We've come to accept these 'no notice' interruptions, but I am, and always will be grateful for the understanding from Sue."

Steve has responded to hundreds of calls but he remembers one major incident in particular, the day the Bull Hotel caught fire in the 1980s:

"My wife and I had just arrived back home from holidaying in Cornwall, so I wasn't even on the on-call rota. But hearing the commotion outside, I leaped into action, reporting to the duty officer at the scene. It was personal too; my wife's manager and his children lived above the hotel. The fire completely gutted the building but thankfully no lives were lost. An incident so close to home makes you appreciate the role of fire and rescue; and why I do what I do as an on-call officer." *Christine Barefield - Oxfordshire Fire & Rescue*

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BURFORD FESTIVAL 2024

A excellent range of musical, dramatic, social, educational and other events over 10 days provided Burford with possibly its best festival yet!

With too many events to feature here we have selected just a few to review - but everyone involved should be congratulated on a most enjoyable and successful achievement.

Cool. Dude of the Mountains

Whether it was the flatness of boyhood Slough or the leap from textbook geology at Leeds University to the actual Himalayan mountains which first inspired Kenton Cool to his life of intrepid adventures on the world's highest peaks, local residents and visitors certainly enjoyed learning more about his life and his expert knowledge of Mount Everest in his talk, "Adventures on the Mountain".

Taking his audience on a journey spanning some 55 million years to his own, recent, 18th conquest of the world's highest mountain, Cool's passion and humour made for a most enjoyable and exciting afternoon.

Anecdotes and tales of the failures and successes of climbing expeditions were brought to life in colourful accounts of the many teams who have attempted to conquer the summit since the 1920s, succumbing in some cases to the treacherous and inhospitable landscape.

Britain's most successful Himalayan climber, Cool also gives talks on leadership challenges and critical decision making in hostile environments, skills he has learned from personal experience.

A lively and passionate speaker, Cool's highly entertaining talk gave a fascinating insight into how Everest was declared the world's highest mountain and the pains and dramas which then ensued personally and politically for the international climbers who wished to reach its summit.

Cool's book, 'One Man's Everest', is available to purchase online or in book stores, published by Arrow Books.

Cider with Rosie by Laurie Lee - A Rehearsed Reading Performed by the Local Community

This year, 'Cider with Rosie' was the choice for a community rehearsed reading, performed by local residents and members of the Wychwood Players local amateur dramatic group.

Capturing many charming and poignant memories of childhood, along with some of its darker moments, Laurie Lee's work has been skilfully adapted by Nick Darke into a play script which draws beautifully from Lee's own poetic and lyrical text.

Expertly directed by Hazel Hughes, the small cast recreated the chaos, banter, humour and rivalry of family life in a rural Cotswold cottage in Slad, using just a few props and minimal furniture and with musical extracts by English composers.

At times hilarious, at times horrific, each cast member played several characters convincingly and sympathetically, Lee's "brightness of spirit" reflected throughout. These were tough times and, despite the romance and poetry of his mother's own reminiscences, the hardship endured and brutality of life was ever present, albeit laced with poetic charm, humour and wit

Short extracts from Lee's original book were interspersed throughout, adding detail to the account being played out before us. One of Lee's originally proposed titles, "The Abandoned Shade", was subsequently used instead for a particularly poignant poem, which was performed at the outset

Sensitively and delightfully dramatised, the whole cast, director and crew are to be congratulated on an excellent rendition of this classic work.



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

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
